



Notes From Karen's Trip to the AAW Symposium in Nashville, TN

I've been asked if I would give a summary of the 2018 Tennessee Association of Woodturners 30th Annual Symposium I attended January 26 and 27.

There were four demonstrators and I attended classes by all.

Jimmy Clewes is a great and very entertaining demonstrator. One of his demos was on a Colored Rim Platter including Design and Ergonomics.



He also did a demo on how to turn a water flask, which I found extremely interesting.





I also watched him do a Tri-Corner Bowl with a Lid. I don't have a picture for that, but I do have thorough notes.

Mike Mahoney, who is known for his production work, did a demo on Hollow form with Threaded Lid. He used a beautiful piece of redwood with a blackwood top. I learned a lot just watching him. Mike is also very entertaining.

Stuart Batty, another Englishman turner with a great sense of humor, turned a huge bowl teaching the art of cutting.

And, last, but not least, Betty Scarpino, internationally known woodturner/sculptor, was my favorite. I have long admired her work. She showed us dying, liming, bleaching, painting and how to cut a piece on a bandsaw and make it into a work of art. She demonstrated how to make artistic pods. Her liming process is the same as that done by the lady from the Jacksonville club. I have provided several photos of Betty's work. One of my favorites is this egg. It is one piece and made from Walnut. The 'band' is

bleached. And, the design is burned. She elevates the band and makes a groove at the edges to help with the straight line of the bleach.



It was auctioned off at the banquet for almost \$200.

Two of the demonstrators favored Thompson tools. None of them uses scrapers unless they are smoothing a ridge. They all have their own ideas about grinds. Batty believes in the 40 degree grind. He offered a free video on grinding if we e-mail him, which I will do.

The Instant Gallery had many beautiful pieces of turnings. I have also provided some photos of my favorites. One display is all John Jordan's work. He did not demonstrate, but he did have a special presentation one evening.

Over 400 people attended this symposium. There were approximately 25 vendors. If you have an opportunity to attend any of their future symposiums, I would highly recommend going.
